Juncus textilis Buch., BASKET RUSH. Perennial herb, rhizomatous, with photosynthetic stems, fibrous-rooted, many-stemmed at base, shoots typically unbranched, regularly and closely spaced in a straight along a straight rhizome, erect to arching, 100–200 cm tall; shoots with 3–4 leaves lacking blades (cataphylls), dark green, glabrous; rhizomes horizontal and creeping, 60–85 mm belowground, 7–15 mm diameter, very tough, covered with stiff scales, the scales appressed-ovate, 10–35 mm long, glossy dark and light brown, acute at tip and often split to appear 2-lobed. Stems: cylindric, to 2-5 mm diameter at base, tough, finely striped with alternating narrow dark green and broader pale green strips (bearing stomates), with sheathing, nonphotosynthetic cataphyll sheaths at base; outer layers with strong fibers, core cottony and white. Leaves: helically alternate, sessile with sheath; sheath open, 40–200 mm long, the shortest at shoot base, fibrous, parallel-veined with scarious margins, lacking lobes (auricles) at top; blade apparently present on only the uppermost leaf, reduced to a small tail-like tip, < 4 mm long, dull light brown. **Inflorescence:** panicle, terminal but appearing lateral, lax and open, to 160 mm long, with several-many, ± ascending branchlets, branchlets cymelike with many but solitary flowers (not clustered in heads), bracteate, glabrous; bracts alternate, sheathing, bracts subtending panicle 2, the larger bract appearing like a continuation of the stem, vertical, cylindric and fully closed, with inflorescence arising through a lens-shaped gap at base, > or >> inflorescence, to 370 mm long, tapered to a point, the smaller bract awl-like to triangular, 3.5–6 mm long, green centrally but aging tannish brown, scarious and incurved on margins; main axes of panicle arising near base, extremely variable in length and number, often several-branched above; bracts subtending each branchlet 2, distichous, appressed to axis, 1.5–5 mm long, shorter on upper branchlets, scarious, the outer bract 1-veined, acute to acuminate or short-pointed at tip, the inner bract (prophyll) 2-veined, truncate or rounded to notched at tip; bractlets subtending short pedicel 2, distichous, translucent aging scarious, lower (outer) bractlet broadly triangular, ca. 2 mm long, fully developed before upper (inner) one so appearing alternate along an axis, inner bractlet ca 1.5 mm long. Flower: bisexual, radial, 1.5 mm across, nonshowy, closed; tepals 6, in 2 similar whorls, erect, outer tepals acuminate-lanceolate, at anthesis $3.5-4.3 \times 0.6-0.8$ mm increasing to \pm 5 mm long in fruit, green aging brown, with inrolled membranous margins, inner tepals \pm sepal length, 1–1.3 mm wide, acute at tip, transversely arched, with membranous margins wider than margins of outer tepals, 1-veined, persistent; **stamens** 6, free, included; filaments in range 0.3–0.5 mm long, translucent pale green; anthers basifixed, dithecal, linear, 1–1.4 mm long, glossy greenish yellow, longitudinally dehiscent; pollen yellowish; pistil 1, in bud ca. 2.5 mm long; ovary superior, rounded 3sided or 3-lobed, 0.7–1 mm long, greenish, 1-chambered with many ovules in 6 rows on wall; style 3-branched, basal portion 0.7–1 mm long, sharply 3-sided, reddish; the stigmatic branches initially corkscrewlike with 3–4 coils, to \pm 2.5 mm long when uncoiled, brownish or strawberry red. **Fruit:** capsule, loculicidal, 3-valved, many-seeded, ± narrowly ovoid, ca. 4×1.5 mm, dark brown, \pm rounded at tip, when immature having 3 purple lines above midpoint where valves split. **Seed:** ± ellipsoid, 0.5–0.8 mm long, dark amber, lacking an appendage. Early June-mid-July.

Native. Perennial herb occasionally found in southern oak woodland in canyon bottoms, often in shade. *Juncus textilis* has creeping rhizomes forming a series of erect green stems

having sheaths but no leaf blades (cataphylls), and it resembles in this regard certain sedges, which have thicker but spongy stems.

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
